

Definitions House

TEACHER INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Hand out the 'Empty House Sheet' and the 'Cut-out Page' to all students.
- 2. Instruct students to carefully cut out all of the triangles from the cut-out page and keep them on their desk.
- 3. Explain to students that each triangle will have a mixture of key terms and definitions. Their task is to match up every key term to its correct definition. For example, 'Secondary Homelessness' is a key term and its definition is 'Moving between various forms of temporary shelter', therefore, as you can see below, the triangles must be placed so that these terms are matched up.
- 4. Students can read the Homelessness fact book to help them find some of the definitions.
- 5. The 'Teacher Answer Guide' shows how the house should look at the end of the activity.
- 6. Students are to try to place all of the triangles in the correct places within the empty house.
- 7. Once they think they are finished, you should check to verify that they are correct.
- 8. If they are correct, they may glue the triangles in the empty house.
- Once students have done all this, they can cut out the entire house (making sure they don't cut off the terms around the outside) and glue it into their books.
- 10. You may like to debrief with students afterwards and go through the terms/ definitions and elaborate on each one further.







Teacher Guide - Definitions House

DEFINITIONS

- Marginally housed: people in housing situations close to the minimum standard;
- Tertiary homelessness: staying in accommodation that falls below minimum standards.
- Secondary homelessness: moving between various forms of temporary shelter.
- Primary homelessness: people without conventional accommodation.
- Poverty: Being extremely poor; lacking access to essential goods/services.
- Vulnerable: exposed to the possibility of being harmed, either physically or emotionally.
- Inadequate: Insufficient, inept or unsuitable for a particular purpose.
- Shelter: a place giving temporary protection from bad weather or danger.
- Temporary: not permanent; lasting only a short time.
- Housing stress: Cost of housing is high compared to income.
- Affordable: inexpensive or reasonably priced.
- Youth refuge: somewhere that provides emergency accommodation for young people.
- Social housing: rental housing provided by governments or NGOs to assist people with low incomes.
- Human rights: basic freedoms and protections that belong to all people.
- Couch surfing: temporarily staying in other people's homes.
- Desperate: having a great need or desire for something.
- Lonely: without companions; solitary.
- Safety: being protected from danger or risk.
- Disadvantaged: in unfavourable circumstances, especially with regard to financial or social opportunities.
