

### Teacher Guide - Year 8 - Indigenous Australia - Reconciliation

Read the 'Current Issues' (page 21) section of the fact book, then complete the activities that follow.

- 1. What is reconciliation with regards to Indigenous Australians?

  In Australia, reconciliation refers to bringing together Indigenous Australians and other Australians.

  It is about overcoming the gap and inequality between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians. Reconciliation Australia identifies the five dimensions of reconciliation as race relations, equality and equity, unity, institutional integrity and historical acceptance.
- 2. What are some things that Australians can do to contribute to reconciliation? To help support reconciliation, Australians need to acknowledge that Indigenous Australians are the traditional owners of the land and that they have unique relationships to the land, sea and waterways. It is also important that Australians acknowledge that past government policies have led to hardships and disadvantage for many Aboriginal communities. Australians can also join groups that undertake action for reconciliation.
- 3. Why is reconciliation important for the identity of Australia as a nation?

  Reconciliation means Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander rights, histories and cultures are valued and recognised as part of a shared national identity. The identity of Australia as a nation is not complete without a recognition and valuing of Indigenous Australian culture and heritage. Achieving equality with those who have given so much to this nation is the most important contributor to our national identity in the future.
